Do as much as you can ahead. That goes for decorating and table setting as well as for cooking or baking. Leave yourself with as little to do as possible on party day.

Ask a friend for help. Designate someone to help you replenish snacks, dispose of paper trash, check on the kids or anything else that needs doing. Two hands are better than one, and definitely at a party.

Keep the buffet line moving. Providing access to the food from both sides of a table, and/or keeping main dishes separate from the dessert table will help prevent buffet bottlenecks.

Add party favors. Party favors are not just for kids. Make or buy a holiday favor to give departing guests. Fill holiday mugs with candy canes and wrap with cellophane and a bow. Fill mason jars with cocoa mix or malted balls and tie a ribbon around the neck of the jar. Make it even easier by placing a few festive holiday cookies into decorated Zip-loc bags.











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10 Fireplace Safety Tips

Fireplaces are one of the most coveted features in homes today—but they can be hazardous if precautions aren't taken. Whenever you use your fireplace, keep in mind these safety tips, courtesy of the Chimney Safety Institute of America:

- 1. Get an annual chimney check. Have chimneys inspected annually, and cleaned as necessary, by a qualified professional chimney service technician. This reduces the risk of fires and carbon monoxide poisonings due to creosote buildup or obstructions in the chimneys.
- 2. Keep it clear. Keep tree branches and leaves at least 15 feet away from the top of the chimney.
- Install a chimney cap to keep de bris and animals out of the chimney.
- 4. Choose the right fuel. For burning firewood in wood stoves or fireplaces, choose well-seasoned wood that has been split for a minimum of six months to one year and stored in a covered and elevated location. Never burn Christmas trees, treated wood or wrapping paper in your fireplace or wood stove.
- 5. Build it right. Place firewood or fire logs at the rear of the fireplace on a supporting grate. To start the fire, use kindling or a commercial fire lighter. Never use flammable liquids.

- 6. Keep the hearth area clear. Combustible material too close to the fireplace or to a wood stove could easily catch fire. Keep furniture at least 36 inches away from the hearth.
- 7. Use a fireplace screen. Use metal mesh or a screen in front of the fireplace to catch flying sparks that could ignite or burn holes in the carpet or flooring.
- 8. Install smoke and carbon mon oxide detectors. Place detectors throughout the house and check batteries in the spring and fall. When you change your clocks for Daylight Savings Time, remember to check your batteries.
- **9.** Never leave a fire unattended. Before turning in for the evening, be sure that the fire is fully extinguished. Supervise children and pets closely around wood stoves and fireplaces.
- **10.** Discard ashes in a closed metal container and place it away from the house until they have fully cooled.





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












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


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
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7 Tips for Getting a Home Loan

Compare quotes. Beyond the interest rates, there are closing fees and points and commissions. You'll want to compare these for all the lenders on your list. There are several calculators available online that may help you determine which loan provides the best value, including ones offered by ABA.

Choose a trusted lender. Get references from family and friends, and do your research. Check with your local Better Business Bureau, and find out if it has received any complaints about any of the lenders you're considering.

Read between the lines. Slick TV ads, telemarketers or door-to-door salespeople will often offer fast, easy loans for houses, cars and home repair, but not disclose all of the details. Read the fine print. If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

Ask questions. When in doubt, ask for clarification from your lender. Discuss how long the loan process will take, how you will communicate-by phone or email-and who will service your loan.

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5 Tips to Master That Singerbread Hause

Building a gingerbread house has long been a fun, creative and delicious activity for the whole family during the holiday season.

However, anyone who has dabbled in gingerbread home construction knows there is an art to it!

Build in place. Gingerbread houses are awkward to move once completed and you would hate to have it end up on the floor after all your hard work. Identify a spot where you would like to display the gingerbread house and build there if possible or as close as you can. However, avoid areas with direct heat such as air vents or halogen lamps. Also, be mindful of spaces that pets could reach.

Size and shape matter. Unless you're a pro, avoid shapes with curves like rounded walls or domes. Narrow pieces are more likely to snap, so use designs that feature wider pieces. You don't want your pieces to be too thin as they will be more fragile or too thick or they will require more support. Roll your dough to about 1/8 of an inch.

Bake it longer. You want your gingerbread to be harder and sturdier, so bake your gingerbread longer than you would if you were going to eat it. After the initial baking, flip the pieces and put them back in the oven on a lower temperature to dry out the gingerbread as much as possible.

It's ok to cheat. If you need to support your gingerbread house walls and roof, use wooden sticks or cans to provide reinforcement. They can be concealed inside the house. If you want the gingerbread house to only have edible elements, Rice Krispies Treats provide a delicious option for structural support.

Icing, Icing Baby. One of the biggest downfalls to gingerbread house bliss is not using the right type of icing. It is best to make your own Royal Icing. You may need to adjust your sugar and egg white ratio to get the perfect consistency depending on if you are using the icing to connect pieces and provide support or to use as a glue for the decorative elements. 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


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Holiday Cranberry Apple Cider Punch

- 2. Pour into six glasses over ice and top each with 2 ounces of club soda.
- 3. Garnish with cranberries, apple slices, and a sprig of rosemary.

Notes

- Orange juice may be used instead of pineapple juice.
- Angostura bitters may be left out, but it does add a more sophisticated flavor to the punch.
- Spiced Rum or Vodka may be added for an adult version.

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


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
